Friends Annual Book Sale: 6-7 April 2018

The Friends of the Michigan Tech Library will hold their 2018 book sale Saturday 7 April 2018 with the friends-only pre-sale on Friday, 6 April 2018 (memberships available at the door). Please come!

The Friends Annual book sale on Michigan Tech's campus takes place in the Memorial Union Building, in the second-floor ballroom. The pre-sale on Friday will be from 5pm-7pm. Memberships are \$20 for a single membership, \$50 for a family, with discounted memberships of \$15 for students and seniors (over 65). The Saturday main sale (including sale of withdrawn library books) will be from 10am-4pm, with the \$5 bag sale (everything that fits a paper grocery bag for \$5) being held from 3pm-4pm. Free parking is available in University lots for both sales.

Updates at the Library

Steven Walton, Social Sciences and FMTL

The Michigan Tech Library is seeing some changes in 2018. First, at the end of 2017, the Library Director, Ellen Marks, retired after 7 years at Michigan Tech. She was always a great ally of the Friends, and we bid her a fond farewell into retirement. Provost Jacqueline Huntoon said of her leaving, "Ellen has been a phenomenal asset for the University, and I have personally valued the opportunity to work with her. She has taken on some difficult challenges and has transformed literally transformed—the role of the library on our campus." Jill Hodges, recently retired from the Office of Institutional Equity and Inclusion here at Michigan Tech, was convinced to un-retire to lead the library for 6 to 8 months as we search for a new library director. The Friends were asked to provide a representative to the library director hiring committee, a position filled by Steven Walton (also wearing his hat on that committee as a representative from the Social Sciences department). The position is posted (see this link if you are interested in the parameters of the hire: www.jobs.mtu.edu/ postings/6473), and it is hoped that we will have campus

interviews for selected candidates in May and a new director in place by late summer.

In other news, the Friends allocated \$4,500 to the library for the purchase of study carrels. They have finally arrived and are in place on the third floor among the book stacks and are fully occupied nearly every afternoon and evening. Although openplan study space and large collaborative tables as well

as glass-walled group study rooms are the norm in our library these days, there is still a demand for carrels where one can plunk down one's computer, notes, and —*gasp*— even real books to study or work without distraction.

Beyond the specific activities of the Friends, there are a number of changes to the fixtures in the library. The room divider with a high counter and stools that had been in the café area was moved to the third floor, and the library installed a number of computers. This makes the café seating area more open, as you are now able to see from the circulation desk all the way to the east windows and out into the garden and Rheki Hall beyond. The high demand for computers and study space in the library's East Reading Room has seen the rolling partitions creeping ever-eastward, shrinking the meeting-room portion of that space, which has a screen and podium and some new comfortable chairs.

Winter Carnival Book Sale Update

The FMTL 11th annual Winter Carnival book sale was a great success! We realized nearly \$600 on sales of note cards, blankets, and donated books, and received nearly \$250 in generous donations from visitors and patrons. The sales were brisk despite cold temperatures and the competition with many other compelling Winter Carnival events. Cheerful crowds including lots of kids warmed up in the lobby of the Van Pelt and Opie Library with complimentary hot chocolate, fruit, and cookies. We offered our patrons great bargains in books,

Constitution Day

With the support of the FMTL, the library will be hosting campus author events as well as a speaker for Constitution Day.

The first author event will be a celebration of the scholarship of ten recently published faculty from Michigan Tech's Humanities department. The authors include: Drs. Carlos Amador, Michael Bowler, Stephanie Carpenter, Elizabeth A. Flynn (emerita), L. Syd M Johnson, Diane L. Shoos, Jennifer Daryl Slack, Beatrice Quarshie Smith, Dana Van Kooy, and Marcelino Viera-Ramos. Their books convey a humanities engagement with cultural imagination and social critique across a wide range of topics including neuroethics, philosophical thought, Latin American politics and ethics, multilingual writing, technological culture and Cultural Studies, poetry and cultural memory, domestic violence in Hollywood film, and women's professional career paths. The event is to be held on March $22^{\rm nd}$ from 4-6 pm in the East Reading Room of the library.

A second author event will take place on April 12th from 4-6 pm, also in the East Reading Room. Dr. Melissa Baird, an assistant professor of anthropology, will be speaking about her new book, *Critical Theory and the Anthropology of Heritage Landscapes (University Press of Florida)*.

The FMTL have also generously agreed to assist with funds for a Constitution Day speaker. Constitution Day is held on September 17th, with federally funded schools providing programming for this annual event. Plans are in the works to coordinate with the *WWI* in the Copper Country activities that are to be held throughout the area from June through November of 2018 (ww1cc.mtu.edu).

Lindsay Hiltunen, University Archivist with the Michigan Tech Archives, was appointed board member for the Michigan Oral History Association and as chair of MOHA's Education Committee. She will serve a two-year term. Hiltunen also recently joined the Legislator's Research Team, which is under the leadership of the Issues and Advocacy Section of the Society of American Archivists. The team monitors and reports on legislative activity related to archives and archivists.
