Hugh Gorman, Professor of Environmental History and Policy in the Social Sciences department, will be giving a presentation at the Annual Meeting titled *Thinking in Cycles: A Social History of the Nitrogen Cycle and the Challenge of Sustainability.* There will be plenty of time after the presentation for questions and discussion.

Dr. Gorman uses history as a lens through which to examine the interaction of technological innovation, policy choices, and uses of the environment, with the goal being to inform efforts to construct an economy that rewards sustainable practices.

Gorman's presentation will begin after a short business meeting and elections for the Friends of the Van Pelt Library.



Big Changes at the Van Pelt and Opie Library: Developments Towards an Information and Learning Commons

Folks returning to campus this month and visiting the Van Pelt and Opie Library cannot fail to notice an enormous change: funky couches and lounge chairs, big display monitors, and computers, computers, computers! The changes are visible upon entrance to the Library, and they penetrate to all corners. It's steps taken towards producing a new *Information and Learning Commons*.

The idea for an *Information and Learning Commons* took shape over the summer of 2013 in Michigan Tech's Information Technology unit and implementation began in Fall 2013. All told, 250 high-power workstations are being installed in the Van Pelt and Opie Library, vastly expanding the computing power available there. This computer space replaces open laboratories that had previously been located across campus. To produce a true *Commons*, skilled assistance, provided by librarians and library staff, and funds to maintain and innovate on the *Commons* idea will be

necessary. Donor partners are being sought to ensure that the complete vision of the Michigan Tech *Information and Learning Commons* at the Van Pelt and Opie Library takes shape.

The Library and its classic and new resources remain open to all members of the community that have a need for educational or research resources and tools. Each new computer in the Library offers the traditional open and anonymous library login as well as access to the MTU login for students of the university. As the Library opens for students and faculty 24/7, on October 21, the Library will provide expanded hours to members of the community: to midnight each night, opening again at 8:00 a.m. Exceptions are university holidays, winter and spring break.

Executive Summary

Significant changes and enhancements to Michigan Tech's computing environment are occurring to:

- Improve the academic environment, particularly for students
- Respond to, and plan for the way students use technologies today by building an IT environment that anticipates needs for mobile, cloud and 'bring your own device' computing.

• Make the wisest use of funding for technology, the library's services and the support infrastructure.

First Phases

The first two phases of these plans are affecting what are known as the 'open labs' and subsequent repurposing of these spaces based on positive responses to the distributed wireless lounges established recently. Spaces within Van Pelt and Opie Library will be used for high performance workstations, ergonomically supportive furniture and, as part of the library's plans for its transformation, 24-hour services, collaborative furniture and improved wireless, electrical and network supply. Throughout the campus, computer-based classrooms are being upgraded to enhance teaching and learning. We concentrate here on these phases but commit to improved communication from IT with regards to its developing strategies and from the library with regards to its services and spaces.

Evolving Computing and Use Trends in Academia

Delivering the software, tools and information resources that students need requires a mix of powerful desktop, laptop and mobile devices as they evolve. Our ideal is a 'bring your own device' paradigm for computing, information access and learning – an anywhere, anytime model. Our first phases represent the beginning of this transformation: At Georgia Tech and Virginia Tech, students are required to purchase their own laptops and specialized software is delivered to students free-of-charge. IT has already taken steps to develop a network environment that can support this type of 'plug and play' model. And, just as *Canvas*, our new Learning Management System resides in the cloud, on Amazon's Web Services, an increasing number of software and other programs will be delivered through the cloud, turning all types of devices – from tablets to smartphones - into terminals.

Technological and economic considerations and licensing restrictions are actively being balanced to produce an ideal environment for Michigan Tech.

Repurposing of Labs

The changes that affect the distributed, open labs have not been taken lightly. Our considerations have included economic and support matters and are based on careful review of usage data.

Van Pelt and Opie Library

The library continues to evolve as the intellectual heart of the campus with its spaces largely devoted to student study and collaboration needs as library resources, particularly those supporting STEM fields, are published only in digital formats albeit at higher cost. Collaborating with IT for an improved technology environment enables the library to focus its funds on collections and its variety of services. With the new and

expanded *Jackson Center for Teaching and Learning*, an emerging Experimental Teaching Incubator and the importance of our librarians focus on information literacy education, the library's vision of transforming its physical spaces to an Information and Learning Commons will offer the expertise, technologies and support infrastructure capable of dynamically staying current with student and faculty needs today and tomorrow. A commons represents the collective expertise and services from library staff, IT staff and those of the Center for Teaching and Learning.

Update on the University Archives

The end of October marks one year since the fire and water damaged the stacks of the University Archives. The majority of the material was saved due to the quick action and dedication of the archives and library staff. Faculty and students of the Social Sciences Department and experts and partners from the Park Service all made it possible to send nearly 800 wet or damp boxes to a freezer facility in Wisconsin on the night of the fire. The next step, sending all materials to be freeze dried and assessed for damage, was delayed due to Hurricane Sandy as such facilities filled up throughout the country.

Since all the boxes were returned, a team of archives staff began the laborious process of refiling, re-boxing and inventorying the returned materials. The official recovery ended on September 30 and the staff is in the final stages of completing the inventory and returning the materials to the shelves. Students, scholars and visitors can feel confident that the archivists will be able to support their work. A small amount of material was lost to this disaster; the details of the loss will be reported to those interested in November 2013.

The archives is fully back in business under the leadership of Interim University Archivist Julie Blair who is working on, among other projects, the travel to collections grants donated by the Friends of the Library and preparations for the scholarly symposium on the strike to be held in the spring, also supported, in part, by

the Friends. On a light note, Archivist Beth Russell has been invited to New York City to share her wisdom and lessons learned and will be presenting a paper called "Sandy Who?" Congratulations to the dedicated staff of the Archives for their diligence and great humor.

Book Sale will be 1-2 April

The Friends Annual Used Book Sale is scheduled for Tuesday, 1 April (no fooling!) and Wednesday, 2 April 2014 in the Memorial Union Ballroom on Michigan Tech's campus. As a member of the Friends, during the evening pre-sale you will enjoy early shopping, easy (and free!) parking, and the best selection on Tuesday from 5:00-7:00PM. Don't forget to renew your membership!

On Wednesday, the sale continues at 10:00AM with a new selection of withdrawn books from the J.R. Van Pelt and Opie Library, and ends with the bag sale from 3:00-4:00PM. Due to changes in parking regulations on campus, we will no longer be able to provide complimentary parking during hours when parking rules are enforced (7am-4pm). Visitors to campus may park at any metered space for \$0.75/hour or in lot #27 (just west of the Memorial Union) for \$3/day. The book sale uses standardized pricing for the majority of books, with hardback books priced at \$2 and quality paperback books for \$1. Mass market paperbacks (the ones that fit in your back pocket) are a bargain at 50 cents. Antique or special sets are priced separately.

If you cannot wait for the book sale to stock your shelves, stop into the Library during normal operating hours to grab a cup of coffee and check out the book cart where we have books for sale, or visit our mini book sale during Winter Carnival and enjoy complimentary hot cocoa and cookies (Saturday, 8 February 2014).

Book sale revenues have been over \$4,000 for the last five years, generating funds to support numerous projects, including supporting the purchase of the large scanner in the Library, funding of travel study grants, and special funding to support the Archives Symposium about the 1913 Copper Strike.
