Stephanie Carpenter Featured Speaker at the 2025 Friends Annual Meeting

Michigan Tech's Associate Professor of Creative Writing Stephanie Carpenter presented at the 2025 Friends Annual Meeting, discussing her novel *Moral Treatment* (Central Mich. Univ. Press). Her novel received the Summit Series Prize from Central Michigan University.

The meeting took place on Thursday October 23, 2025 in the East Reading Room of the Van Pelt and Opie Library. Friends Chair Amy Hughes recapped the Friends' fiscal year 2025 sales, grants, and fundraising, board members voted to approve renewing board members, and officers were elected for the coming year.

Moral Treatment is a historical novel set in an 1889 Michigan psychiatric hospital, exploring the philosophy of "moral treatment" through the dual perspectives of a young, institutionalized patient named Amy Underwood and the hospital's superintendent. The book examines the era's mental healthcare, contrasting the superintendent's idealistic, humane approach (good food, rest, wholesome influences) with the harsh realities and growing pressures on the institution from local wealthy trustees and Victorian society. All while Amy navigates her confinement and questions her future. The story is heavily influenced by the history of the state hospital in Traverse City Michigan, where the author grew up.

Plans are underway for our next annual meeting in October 2026. Look for an announcement of the date soon!

Yearbooks Donated to Library of Michigan

Responding to a call from the Library of Michigan for secondary and post-secondary yearbooks noticed in *Michigan History* magazine, the Friends recently made a donation of nearly four dozen years' copies of yearbooks from Michigan Tech and Finlandia.

A few years ago, several dozen boxes of *Keweenawan* yearbooks were transferred to the Friends from the Michigan Tech Alumni Office after they cleared out their space. This fall, Friends board member Steve Walton filled six boxes with Michigan Tech yearbooks and sent them to Lansing. We sent two copies—one for permanent archiving, and one as a circulating copy—of every year that the state Library did not already have, as well as a second copy for the ~10 years where they only had one. In case our donated copy turns out to be a better copy than the one currently in their collection (and most of ours were *as new*), the Library of Michigan will make those the permanent archival copy. In all, the Friends sent copies from 45 academic years from between 1916 and 2002. We were also able to include copies of the centennial volume (we have lots if you want one), a single copy of a rather rarer 1965 MTU Soo *Obelisk* from the old Sault Ste. Marie campus (now Lake Superior State Univ.), as well as a handful of Houghton High and one Hancock Central High school yearbooks.

In addition, because Jonathon Nagel came into possession of a whole pile of Suomi College/Finlandia University yearbooks when he purchased the Lieblein House in Hancock (Finlandia University's old Hoover Center; the blue Queen Anne on the corner of Quincy and Ryan Streets in Hancock), and because he was heading down to the Lansing area for the holidays, he kindly delivered our yearbooks along with the 28 years (49 volumes in total) of Finlandia yearbooks from 1946–1986 in his possession. Thank you, Jonathon for schlepping those books to Lansing for us!

As this newsletter goes to press, we are planning for the Friends' Winter Carnival sale to take place in the Main Library entrance hall on Saturday February 7, 2026 from 10am - 3pm at the height of Winter Carnival festivities. We'll report on that sale in the October newsletter.


January 19th. We look forward to a busy semester of research, instruction, and outreach.

Farewell to Peter Van Pelt, a Founder of the Friends

Peter Van Pelt, a founder of the Friends of the Michigan Tech Library group, passed away on Christmas Day, 2025. (www.ahearnfuneralhome.com/obituaries/peter-van-pelt).

Back in 1986, Library Director Phyllis Johnson gathered a group of library lovers to see if we could establish a “friends” group for Michigan Tech’s Van Pelt Library. In that room was Peter Van Pelt, the son of J. Robert Van Pelt, the Michigan Tech University president (1956-1964) for whom the library was named. Peter and his family had retired to the Keweenaw in the 1980s and was a library lover and had a soft spot for the institution named after his father.

Peter (who chaired the meeting), I, Phyllis, and several others spent a couple of meetings hashing through the ideas and needs of the library and wrote bylaws to govern the new group. Library staff had been selling “library discards” (books and other materials) in a public sale every couple of years, and the Friends of the Van Pelt Library, as we were called at the time, took over that task and expanded it by soliciting books from the public to add to the sale. The donated books are now the main feature of the event, which benefits the library.

Peter sat on the board for a bit and he or we, I’m not sure which, recruited his wife Patricia to the board some years later. A book and art lover, Patricia Van Pelt was the guiding force behind the library art collection that adorns the walls of the expanded and renamed Van Pelt and Opie Library.

In 2013 Peter and Patricia retired once again, this time to Massachusetts to be closer to family, and they have now both passed on. Many years of donated work and funds from the Van Pelt family are gratefully acknowledged by the Friends of the Michigan Tech Library. Thankfully, we continue to attract book, library, and art lovers to the Friends so that this institution, at the heart of the campus, can be of service to ongoing generations of Michigan Tech students, faculty, and library patrons.
